

Unlock works by running local projects in UK cities, where a trained Unlock Development Worker, accompanied by a local support group, is employed to encourage and enable local people and their leaders to grow in faith and confidence by:

Revealing Good News of the Down to Earth Christ
Releasing life changing skills & confidence

2010 walk sponsorship and donations have topped £26,000. This is a fabulous effort and beats every walk in the last 8 years apart from 2007. Search for Unlock on the Everyclick webpage and follow the simple process to make an online donation using a credit or debit card via their secure server.

Your donation will be collected and distributed to Unlock by Charities Trust, including a 28% Gift Aid on qualifying donations. 100% of your donation through Everyclick will go to Unlock. Donations made through Everyclick are processed in real time by their payment partner Charities Trust (Charity Reg No 327489). Funds will be transferred by Charities Trust to Unlock at the end of every month. Charities Trust automatically reclaim Gift Aid on all qualifying donations made by UK taxpayers, which means that an additional 28% will go to Unlock.

Hospitals
The walk goes by two historic London hospitals: Barts is Britain's oldest hospital, founded in 1123. It was one of the first hospitals to encourage the use of anaesthetics, making a great many more kinds of operation possible. Amongst the people who worked there are Dr Parkinson, after whom the disease was named, and Dr Barnardo.

Guys' is much newer, founded in 1721 by Thomas Guy, a publisher of Bibles. It is run jointly with St Thomas' hospital in Waterloo, and is the busiest in the country, with 900,000 patients last year. Its tower is the tallest hospital building in the world, with the upper levels housing the school of dentistry.

Paternoster Square
takes its name from Paternoster Row, the centre of the London publishing trade until it was devastated in the blitz. The current development, completed in 2003 and housing the London Stock Exchange amongst others, replaces a highly unpopular 1960's office development.

Markets
There has been a livestock market at Smithfield for over 800 years, and its charter insists that it remains open to the public, but you need to get there early - most of the business is done between 3 and 7am. It was also the location for Bartholomew Fair - an annual three day fair established in 1133 by the nearby monastery of St Bartholomew, who also set up the hospital. Originally it was for the cloth trade, but it was suppressed in 1555 for violence, drunkenness and debauchery.

Borough Market is by far the busiest part of the walk, particularly as the market is disrupted by building works to do with the upgrading of the Thameslink rail service. As well as being a fashionable place to buy gourmet food it is also often used as a film set; much of *Bridget Jones' Diary* and *Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels* were made here.

The Shard at London Bridge
The construction site already dominates the skyline and when completed (expected to be 2012) it will be over 1,000 ft tall, and the highest building in the European Union. It will be clad entirely in glass, and will have a viewing platform on the 72nd floor. It will be a mixture of shops, offices and housing.

Elephant and Castle
The huge, long-awaited redevelopment of the area continues - the Heygate estate around the Crossways Church, has been emptied and is due for demolition 'soon'. The first new housing in the tower block to the South of the Southern Roundabout. In May 2009, the Elephant and Castle redevelopment was designated as one of only 16 founding projects of the Climate Positive Development Program, established by former US President Bill Clinton, which supports the development of large-scale urban projects that demonstrate cities can grow in ways that are 'climate positive.'

Archbishops Park
This was originally part of the grounds of Lambeth Palace, but Lambeth Palace to local families. A section of the grounds known locally as 'Lambeth Palace Field' was put aside for children to play, and in 1900 it was decided that Lambeth Palace Field should be turned into a public park, but still under the ownership of the Church Commissioners.
