Siggy, is the Unlock worker in Woodhouse, Sheffield. To mark the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage in 2018 Siggy used her cartoon drawing skills to offer an opportunity for the mixture of church and community folks who come along to the church's coffee mornings and lunch clubs to learn and to think about women in the Bible as well as other women in more recent history.

Siggy tells the story: -

The highlight of the last month has got to be the work I'm doing on the **Bible Women**. It's growing like 'Topsy' and has generated more discussion on the Bible than in the last two years. I started this with a list of modern women chosen by women using the church, but once I began transferring them with their Biblical counterparts onto the poster roll, people began to suggest further women. This was from people who had been a part of the original discussion, but now the men and other women were making suggestions. One man even came in with an English Heritage magazine that had an article on women honoured with a blue plaque and asked if I could include them too.



People who come to the lunch club have stopped by to ask what I'm doing - it's usually quite hard to engage with these folks, because they're busy eating, and you can't really get them to join in when they're having a meal. So for them to approach me has been grand. I've also had the staff who bring the group of people with learning difficulties come to talk to me. They have never taken any notice of my activities before. And the greatest delight was that a man I had called out for racist remarks at the time of the EU referendum came to see what I was doing and stopped for a chat. Ever since I challenged him I have spoken to him every time I have seen him and his wife, determined to be Christ-like in my approach, so for him to be interested in what I'm doing is exciting frontline stuff.



The Slimming World group, I'm told, has had some discussions as a result of the pictures because Deborah features and the lady who runs Slimming World is also called Deborah and she hadn't known the origin of her name. This led to another woman then wanting to know if her name would figure on the poster roll. There has been talk around Sarah, Hagar and their place in the Jewish and Muslim faiths; discussion from both Christian and non-believers alike around characters they didn't know about; and some have even gone home to do further research on some of the Biblical characters. I was particularly pleased about this last, as that includes a couple of very knowledgeable local preachers!



I draw the next characters on to the poster roll when I am at coffee morning (or in one instance, at the Wednesday Art Club). Having said that, at the last two or three coffee mornings I have not managed to draw anything at all because I've been too busy talking!

I think the nature of the work is very approachable and safe. People are always interested to watch people drawing, and I think people have come to chat because they want to see what I'm doing. And because its cartoons, it's safe enough for people to ask questions. I've been very surprised and very excited at the reaction.

The following pages include a range of different activities that can be used alongside having the Bible Women banners on display; to help people explore the stories and the place of women in the Bible and the world.

Choose one of the uncoloured pictures of the women that you are drawn




Colour it in and as you do so reflect on the woman's story and any similarities you feel there may be between her story and your own.

Think about the following questions and discuss them with those around you.


- Are there any women here that surprise you?
- That you agree with being included or that you disagree with?
- Do any of the women's actions, choices or influence speak into your own experiences on your faith journey?
- Is there anything that resonates with you?
- Can you see a bigger picture emerging?





Take a grape (or two) - As you eat them think about the fruitfulness and richness that comes when we work together and live as our unique selves in the plans that God has for us, connected to the vine.

Think of the fruitfulness that has come from the lives of the women displayed.



Where has God brought fruit from your life? Where would you like to see him bring fruit?

Read the Poem "The Lord of One"

Take a jigsaw piece and write on it your name and a skill that you have that God has given you.

Think about the poem as you connect your piece to the jigsaw. Read what the people who have



come before you have written.

Think about the bigger picture that you are part of in God's plan.

Holding the very fabric, Of this fragile world,


Together,

and of the one..

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



Take a heart from any of the baskets that you feel drawn to. Using the colour code and the themes in the baskets reflect and write or draw your thoughts on some hearts.

Hang the heart up on the display as a prayer alongside the others








The Place of Women



Having the Bible Women banners on display creates a unique opportunity to connect with your local community.

The images and stories of the women create connections with many aspects of human life and the lives of local communities.

One church created a participative community event which they called 'The Place of Women' to which all sorts of local organisations were invited as contributors. What they brought to the event was not necessarily Christian but their displays sat alongside the Bible women and each threw light onto the other, with each attracting more different people into the space where they could encounter the Bible Women and their stories. Not being overly prescriptive about what organisations brought to the event was deliberate—we wanted to leave people free to interpret the theme and engage in whatever way seemed most relevant to them.

The 'Place of Women' was so popular that the church decided to keep the displays up for two full weeks (rather than the 4 hours originally planned) so that more people could come and see them.

Alongside this was a Sunday sermon series highlighting the stories of some of the women on the banners - including those whose stories rarely appear in Sunday lectionary readings.

The Vicar writes: -

It has been a joy and a privilege to house Bible women. We had them in church for an extended period and took the opportunities they offered to focus our preaching and teaching through Lent, Holy week and Easter Sunday, through the lens of women's experience. This gave us, as a congregation, the opportunity to engage with some very thorny and contemporary issues and to focus on how all these stories of complexity and pain are woven into Jesus's DNA through the women in his ancestry. Simply having the women in church was a powerful conversation starter and stimulated a number of creative and useful conversations with a diverse range of people. Inviting the community in to be part of a Resource day focussing on issues pertaining to women, called 'The Place of Women', helped us get the most out of the opportunities the women created. The different contributors came from a very broad range of starting points and the event was an effective eye opener for the community challenging their preconceptions about the Church's attitude to women and women in history. Very practically it allowed us as a small church with limited resources to offer something meaningful into the community because it didn't call on us to resource the event, simply to coordinate it round the focal point of the Bible Women.

Introducing Unlock

Unlock, by various names, has been around since 1972, trying to help (mainly) urban Christians to understand and share their faith appropriately. Our life experience matters; our stories; our joys and sorrows. The Bible has plenty to say, more than we'll ever know, about our lives, if we know how to read it and apply it - if we know how to **UNLOCK** it!

The work outlined in this pack uses the learning cycle on page 28, **starting by using a 'prompt'** or ice breaker to draw out group member's stories, in this case; 'tell me about important and influential women in history that you can think of'. Allow plenty of time for people to respond to the prompts and share their own experiences and listen carefully as they do. What are the themes and issues arising in the stories? Try to remember so that you can remind people later if necessary.

The next stage is to **find part of the Bible** that comes to mind having listened to the stories. If you are using these sessions with a non-church group you will need to be ready to provide some Bible links, but only if they are unable to do so. It is always worth giving them a chance to come up with a Bible link for themselves first; they may surprise you! Then ask the group to explore **connections**, similarities or differences.

Finally there is a **reflective activity**, giving people an opportunity to reflect on the session and any action they might want to take as a result. The reflective activity creates space in which discussion and reflection can continue in an unforced way. In this case, colouring in the posters.

How well the group know and trust one another will affect the type of story that they share, often the newer the group, the more light hearted the stories are likely to be.

Unlock uses an approach to engaging with the Bible that is different to traditional Bible studies (see page 29). Unlock's approach starts from the stories and experiences of group members, whereas a more traditional approach starts from the Biblical text. Unlock's approach has been found to work well with small groups of urban, oral learners from outside of the church. There are many free resources on the Unlock website designed for use with such groups. However, because each of these resources was designed for a particular group in a particular time and place they are unlikely be a perfect fit for your group as they stand. They are offered more as inspiration to you to design your own materials along the same lines, rather than as ready to use packages.

Unlock usually works with people outside of church who may be interested in finding out a bit more about faith but perhaps are not attracted to the formal methods of learning often associated with church. Our work is based on a reflective learning cycle and is a tried and tested way of introducing people to the Bible in a non-threatening way. Many churches have activities that draw in members of their surrounding community but then struggle with how to move on from those relationships into exploring faith, especially in urban environments where anything formal might be treated with suspicion.

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
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The Unlock Learning Cycle
